Heb. 1:1-2

Introduction

- I. The book of Hebrews is one of the “meatier” books of the New Testament.
- II. The writer of Hebrews was trying to encourage Jewish Christians to remain faithful to the New Testament.

Discussion

- I. Hebrews shows the superiority of Jesus and His Law.
 - A. Superior to angels (Heb. 1:4-6).
 - B. Superior to Moses (Heb. 2:3; 3:3).
 - C. Superior as a High Priest (Heb. 5:5).
 - D. Superior as a mediator (Heb. 8:6).
 - E. Superior as to His blood (Heb. 9:12).
 - F. Superior as to His New Covenant (Heb. 10:9).
 - G. There is a strong warning to those that would have been tempted to leave Christ for the Old Law (Heb. 10:28-29).
- II. Hebrews 1:1-2 contains some very important facts.
 - A. God does exist (Psm 14:1; 53:1).
 - B. God spoke to the men of old (Gen. 12:1-3; Exo. 33:11; etc.)
 - C. God still speaks to men today through His Son and His Word (Matt. 17:5 John 6:44-45; 2 Thess. 2:14; Col. 3:16; Acts 20:32).
- III. Notice the progression of God's way of speaking unto us
 - A. Through His Son (Heb. 1:1-2).
 - B. The Son has spoken through His words (John 12:48).
 - C. His words were conveyed through His apostles (John 17:20; Acts 2:14).
 - D. The Word was recorded and preserved for us to read and study (2 Tim. 3:16-17).
 - E. Through our reading and studying, we learn and understand God's Word (Eph. 3:3-4).

Conclusion

- I. We should be grateful that God wants to communicate with us.
- II. If we are ignorant of God's Word, then it is our faults and not His (Hos. 4:6).
