"Born Again" John 3:1-5

Introduction

- I. Whenever we sin for the first time, we no longer are innocent in the eyes of the Lord (Rom. 6:23).
- II. Without a change, our souls will be punished forever (Luke 13:3).
- III. It is at this time that we need to be "born again"!

Discussion

- I. Being "born again" is essential to salvation (John 3:1-5).
 - A. Let us notice Nicodemus.
 - 1. Pharisee
 - 2. A ruler of the Jews/master of the Jews
 - 3. His name means "victorious".
 - 4. Defended Jesus (John 7:50-52).
 - 5. Was instrumental in the burial of Jesus (John 19:38-40).
 - 6. Nicodemus came to Jesus with an open mind (cf. John 8:48, 52; Mark 3:22).
 - B. Without being "born again", man cannot see God, nor enter the kingdom of God (John 3:3, 5).
 - C. Being a Jew, Nicodemus would have thought that his physical birth was enough to be in the kingdom of God (cf. That others were not as willing to listen and learn; John 6:66-68).
- II. How does one become "born again" (John 3:5-13)?
 - A. John had already been baptizing and preaching repentance for the remission of sins (Mark 1:4).
 - B. Baptism is the dividing line of death and "born again" (Rom. 6:1-6; "new creature").
 - C. Obedience to the law of Christ, which includes baptism for the remission of sins, is absolutely essential to be "born again" (1 Pet. 1:22-23).
- III. Being "born again" is therefore possible and attainable (John 3:14-21).
 - A. The lifting of the serpent gave "new life" to those who were dying (Num. 21).
 - 1. They still had to look at the serpent.
 - 2. Refusal to look at the serpent resulted in death.
 - B. Jesus has been lifted, and as such, offers "new life" to those who are dying.
 - 1. We must still look to Jesus.
 - 2. Obeying His Word give "new life" (Heb. 5:9).
