## "The 'Green Eyed Monster'" James 3:13-18

## Introduction

- I. It is sad to watch what envy and jealousy can do to a person (Prov. 14:30; Gal. 5:19-21).
- II. Pride and lack of contentment are often to blame (Prov. 16:18; Heb. 13:5).
- III. Using the Old Testament, we can see how envy and jealousy helped to destroy a man (Saul; 1 Sam. 18:1-30).

## Discussion

- I. The beginning of envy (1 Sam. 18:1-9).
  - A. Saul began to notice that David was getting better accolades than he.
  - B. In the New Testament, we are given a warning about comparing ourselves to other people (2 Cor. 10:12).
  - C. Saul was very insecure, and as such, he allowed himself to think badly of David.
  - D. Keep in mind that David was simply being a faithful servant.
- II. The effects of envy (1 Sam. 18:10-29).
  - A. Envy will cause us not to think and act rationally.
  - B. Saul began to want David dead (1 Sam. 18:11-12, 25; 19:9-17).
    - 1. Saul tried to kill David personally.
    - 2. Saul tried to have David killed in battle.
  - C. Fear became a part of Saul's life (1 Sam. 18:12, 15, 29).
    - 1. David was loyal.
    - 2. Sometimes envy will cause us to imagine false things.
    - 3. Saul's envy and fear even led him to trying to kill Jonathan, his own son (1 Sam. 20:30-34).
    - 4. Saul had priests killed (1 Sam. 22:13-18).
  - D. Envy and jealously cost Saul in so many ways (cf. 1 Sam. 28:16).

## Conclusion

- I. Envy and jealousy should never be allowed in our lives.
- II. Let us make sure that we learn from the lesson of Saul so that we do not fall as he did.
