## "Imagery from Jeremiah" Jer. 1:4-10

## Introduction

- I. The man Jeremiah was one of God's great prophets.
- II. In his writings, Jeremiah often used great imagery to teach his point
- III. Let us notice some of those images and the lessons that we can glean from them (Rom. 15:4).

## Discussion

- 1. The Fountain of Living Waters and Broken Cisterns (Jer. 2:12-13).
  - A. Water is an extremely important resource.
  - B. Some places do all that they can to collect as much water as necessary.
  - C. Imagine forsaking endless water for a container that leaks and you have the imagery of God's people during the time of Jeremiah (cf. John 4:10-14; Rev. 22:17).
- II. Forward and not Backward (Jer. 7:22-23).
  - A. The Israelites had been told what to do, but unfortunately they chose to do otherwise.
  - B. We must make the decision to always do the Lord's will, and as such we move forward, not backward (Gal. 1:6-9; Heb. 10:39; Luke 9:62).
- III. Vanity of Shaping Idols (Jer. 10:3-5).
  - A. God's people would work diligently to fashion themselves idols that were useless and lifeless.
  - B. Christians must make sure that we do not "shape" our own idols today (1 John 5:21; 1 Cor. 10:14; Col. 3:5).
- IV. Heath in the Desert (Jer. 17:5-7).
  - A. A tree in a salty, desolate place will not thrive like a tree with an abundance of water.
  - B. A child of God must remain faithful to God, Who is the giver of all blessings (James 1:17; Psm. 1; Rev. 2:10).
- V. A Burning Fire (Jer. 20:7-10).
  - A. Like many faithful proclaimers of God's Word, Jeremiah dealt with discouragement and persecution.
  - B. We must make sure that God's Word is so important to us that we cannot help but preach and teach it to others (Luke 24:32-35; Acts 8:4; 2 Tim. 4:2).
- VI. Rising Early (Jer. 44:2-5).
  - A. God had not been slack in warning his people of their error and disobedience, and as such was right to punish them.
  - B. Christians should make sure that they do pattern themselves after those in Jeremiah's time (Jer. 44:16-18; cf. John 8:29; Matt. 7:21-23).
